





NEW YORK TIMES ALL ACCESS

The New Hork Times

Barrington Public Library now offers all Barrington cardholders complimentary and unlimited access to everything The New York Times has to offer! Access NYTimes.com while onsite and connected to the library Wi-Fi. Access all of The Times — including News, Games, Cooking, Audio, Wirecutter, The Athletic, and all apps — from anywhere!

Instructions:

- Create a New York Times account (username and password) at NYTimes.com
- For in-library access, simply log in to your account.
- For remote/offsite access (from home or outside the library), a 24hour code is required.

MOBILE PRINTING

Print directly from your mobile device using the Princh App, available for both iOS & Android. You can also print for your laptop or desktop at home by visiting **print.princh.com** and entering our Printer ID (106364).

Princh allows you to easily upload documents to print at the library. The app provides a numeric code after sending your document to the printer. Enter the numeric code (for example, 1234) at the touchscreen kiosk beside the printer to release your job.

You can pay online with a credit card before your library visit or at the reference desk with cash when you come in.

We are fine free and do not charge overdue fines!




A story about dating, ambition, and coming-of-age within an immigrant community whose affection is endearing, maddening, and never boring.

The Writing Room by Marcia Mickelson


After eighteen-yearold Maya is kicked out of her wealthy dad's NYC home, she is grounded by a shared writers' workspace where she finds her voice.

A classroom of middle schoolers with disabilities creates an imaginary "wizarding school" that seemingly becomes real and turns the whole school upside down.




Night Chef by Mika Song

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the continued growth of the library at our Fall Book Sale in November. We are deeply grateful to the members who donated their time, expertise, financial support, and passion, helping us uphold our long-standing tradition of "paying it forward" for future generations.

The book sale was filled with energy and excitement. What began as casual browsing often turned into meaningful conversations about why we choose the books we do. At the entrance, a table of "special treasures" caught many eyes. One gentleman, already finished shopping, stopped short when he spotted a large volume on Italian Renaissance. "Oh my God—Nonna would love this for Christmas," he said, and promptly bought it, explaining its significance to his children.

Throughout the sale, comments floated through the room: "I just bought a book I donated—time to read it again." "You really have the complete Harry Potter set?" "I'm a fiction writer, so I'm buying nonfiction to broaden my mind."

A teacher shared how thrilling it was to purchase a wide variety of books for students at a time when school budgets are limited.

Shoppers of all ages filled the rooms, many returning day after day. One man came back six times, filling boxes of books. When asked what he planned to do with them, he laughed and said he would build more bookshelves and alphabetize everything—hopefully before his daughter noticed. Children eagerly searched for treasures of their own, and book club members celebrated finding multiple copies of favorite titles.

Children's books flew off the shelves, while music, DVDs, CDs, and even sheet music delighted patrons eager to rediscover old favorites or share them with family. Creativity was everywhere, with puzzles, games, art kits, gift cards, and library-themed items finding new homes.

Each and every one of you should be proud. Together, we truly did it.
